as a review....Western Heritage is an up-andcoming 4-H shooting sport that is gaining in

from the 1860-1890 time period.

There are 2 basic parts to the Western Heritage Shooting Sport:

- 1 personas adopted by youth (and parents if so inclined), and:

State Archery Results

The Kansas 4H Shooting Sports State Archery Match was held in Lindsborg, KS, Saturday, September 24, 2022. Four archers from Crawford County participated after prequalifying in a separate event. Brenden Knisley, John Walker, Gavin Jackman, and Kole Harris represented the county's Archery Project Group in the Bowhunter Compound Class. John Walker took top honors in the Junior Open Compound Class, bringing home ribbons for 4th place in the FITA event (10 ring targets), 1st place in the Trail event (3D and Field targets), and 2nd place overall. The Bowhunter Team of Brenden Knisley and John Walker did well, taking 12th place out of 16 teams. Congrats to all for representing us at the event! Look for the Archery Project Group to start back up again next April. Details should be in the February or March newsletter.

Partent/Guardian Must Read Fair Proposal Process

I am excited to continue a more formal process has been created to receive and evaluate fair rules, updates, and guidelines. Fair changes will be made through collaboration with the Fair Board, 4-H Council, and Extension. A special committee made up of members representing each entity will receive and evaluate the changes. The move to a special committee has been done in an effort to ensure that every voice is heard and all changes and decisions are made in collaboration for the benefit of our youth.

- Option 1 Present changes through your 4-H Council. The 4-H form must be presented at or before the August 4-H Council Meeting.
- Option 2 Present changes to the Fair Board. The Fair Board form must be presented on or before the September meeting. You may choose either option. You must present your option in-person.

Each clubs 4-H Council Representatives are in charge of presenting each proposal that is made at

Council to their club. They are then responsible for representing their clubs position on each proposal at the October 4-H Council meeting.

The Fair Board will also complete a similar process of reviewing all proposals.

The collaboration committee will meet in early November to compare what proposals everyone agreed on and what ones need to be worked through. These representatives are there to uphold the decisions and discussion from the group they represent. They are also there to work through disagreements when necessary and come up with a compromise if possible. If you have any questions on the process please contact, Will.

Fair Roles and Responsibility

(Section 10.4, Kansas 4-H Policy)

"K-State Research and Extension holds responsibility in cooperation with 4-H Council and/or fair board for developing 4-H rules at the 4-H county fairs and 4-H events. These rules must be consistent with the 4-H mission and 4-H policies including site-based risk management."

"Local 4-H fair rules must be in compliance with and will not supersede state and national 4-H policy; however, fairs may design local classes and events that enhance the educational mission of the 4-H program."

As the Youth Development Agent, my goal and role is to oversee our 4-H program in Crawford County and provide the best and the most opportunity for youth. I know that the proposal process is still new and confusing for some but it helps to ensure that all voices are heard, changes are collaborative and are documented. I am trying my best and enforce regulations and updates that I receive from KSRE and State 4-H while preserving the culture and tradition of the Crawford County Fair. Please know I am only human so there may be a few bumps in the road but please know that I am the type of person that will constantly strive to do what's best for youth and the 4-H program.

According to extension policy (see above), all fair decisions should be made by Extension in collaboration with Fair Board and 4-H Council. (Except for the livestock sale which is Fair

Board) A collaboration is exactly what we are doing here in Crawford County. When it comes to the changes themselves, they are divided into indoor exhibits and livestock.

Indoor exhibits are to qualify at the county level in order to move on to State Fair. This means that every year as the 4-H Agent, I receive updates to put in our Fair Book from the State 4-H Office. This ensures that youth participating in these projects are following the guidelines that Kansas 4-H has set for the project, whether they are going to state or not. These do not typically come out until late February/March but are listed in red in the online fair book by April 1st. These changes are typically minor, like a description change, name change, measurement, etc. If there is ever something that is more than a minor change that has an impact on how we judge and award classes at the county level then I will complete an emergency proposal for that change to make sure that it is documented and sent out to everyone. Our yearly indoor exhibit updates ensure that youth are not being disqualified when moving on to the next level. I agree that all of our indoor projects do not match perfectly with the state. But as I have said, don't always catch everything and welcome help if anyone would like to volunteer to cross-edit these portions.

Livestock is where we get into a gray area because youth do not have to qualify at the County Fair in order to show at the State Fair. To be honest I do not like gray areas. This means that as long as we are not going against 4-H policy or regulations, there is a little more freedom to make things our own. All decisions must still be collaborative involving our 4-H Council, Extension and Fair Board to ensure the best experience for our kids as a whole.

I know that all of this may seem confusing and that people may have some questions. *My door is always open for anyone that would like to come in and discuss things.* Please know that rudeness, disrespect, or yelling will not be tolerated. Some may say that other counties do not do this or we did not do it like this in the past. There are 105 counties in Kansas and I can guarantee you that they all do 4-H different. Some follow the rules and some do not. However, I am someone who tries to follow the

rules and promise you that I will try to go above and beyond in my communication to everyone and be as transparent as possible.

4-H is a constantly changing and evolving program and I am glad that it is. Our program has to change to stay current for our youth. There are some traditions we can fight to keep and some that have to adapt to the times. Thank you for utilizing the proposal system for fair changes. I truly believe this is the best step towards equal representation for all parties involved.

Plan for the future! 4-H Camp Scholarships

Camp Scholarships are available through 4-H Council. These are limited to one per-youth per-year. To be eligible for this you must complete a Talk/Demonstration at County 4-H Club Days or participate at Favorite Foods Contest. The Scholarship will be refunded up to \$100 upon the youths return from camp. This is a great way for youth to experience more youth development opportunities! There is also the scholarship from Carolyn Zagonel and Americas Farmers grow Comminutes donation. By filling out this application youth can receive \$100 scholarship to go toward a 4-H camp/activity.
