#### Livestock Tag/Weigh-In-

Below is some information for the Livestock Tag/Weigh In for the 2025 Fair. Remember it is not required that you weigh in but it is required for all market animals and bucket calves to be tagged in either on or **BEFORE** the designated days listed below. If you cannot make the designated tag in days, then you need to make prior arrangements with me to set a time to tag your animals. No animals will be tagged after the designated tag in days. DO NOT WAIT UNTIL THE LAST **MINUTE TO MAKE THE ARRANGEMENTS** IF YOU ARE UNABLE TO ATTEND OR YOU **RISK NOT GETTING YOUR ANIMALS TAGGED IN ON TIME. LACK OF PLANNING ON YOUR PART DOES NOT CONSTITUTE AN EMERGENCY FOR ME!** 

**Small Animals-** Small Animals include Bucket Calves, Market Goats, Market Sheep, and Market Swine. This will be at the Fairgrounds on Saturday, April 26th, 8:00-10:00 AM. The tags are \$3 each for goats, sheep, and swine. The tags are \$4 each for bucket calves. Please bring cash or a check made out to 4-H Council to pay for your tags. If you are unable to attend, you must make prior arrangements with me to tag your animal, or it will not be eligible to show at the fair. DO NOT WAIT UNTIL THE LAST MINUTE TO MAKE THE ARRANGEMENTS IF YOU ARE UNABLE TO ATTEND OR YOU RISK NOT GETTING YOUR ANIMALS TAGGED IN ON TIME.

Breeding class animals do not have to be tagged; however, I encourage you to tag them if something happens to your market class animal.

Hello 4-H Families, the Western Heritage shooting sports project continues to meet about every 4-6 weeks, depending on people's schedules. In our last meeting, Mr. Shoemaker (and Derrick and Abby) demonstrated Dutch oven cooking over the campfire. They made a delicious blackberry cobbler. Mr. Sandford showed everyone how to cut wood using both one and two-person crosscut saws. Cutting firewood in the frontier days was a lot of work! Our shooting range continues to grow with a dedicated safety zone, many plate gong targets, a cowbell target that rings when you hit it, a prairie dog and several squirrel targets, and new shotgun targets--we even have the challenge of shooting and breaking shotgun sporting clays resting on top of a fence rail. We have friendly competitions for both the number of hits and elapsed time. We would love to have more participants in this shooting sport, and parents are always welcome to take part in any of the activities. In our next meeting on November 30th, we will have a guest to teach us about pistols and rifles that use black powder including going to the range to give them a try. #### Setting the Stage for a Great Fair!

Some of these you may feel do not apply to you, but they are important reminders for us all. It will also help to ensure that we keep each other accountable and hopefully provide a fun, safe, and positive experience for youth. Parents, please share this with your spouse to ensure everyone is on the same page. Attitudes-Positivity! This is what I expect from everyone this year, as we are just over a week away from the first official Fair activity. (Beef Weigh-In) Some of you do an amazing job, but others may need a reminder. 4-H is a Positive Youth Development organization, and sadly, on many occasions, some parents, volunteers, fair board members, etc., seem to lose sight of that. What has happened in the past is in the past, and everyone is expected to do their best moving forward. As they prepare to enter any 4-H event, I expect everyone to check their attitude at the door.

**<u>Relationships-</u>** Personal relationships are just that personal. No room exists for personal hatred, conflict, or rivalry at any 4-H event/activity. Your relationships are yours alone and have no business infecting the attitudes and experiences of those around you.

<u>Grace and Understanding-</u> It is also expected that everyone has a little grace and understanding. NO ONE is perfect or is going to do things perfectly. Not everything will be done or addressed when and how you would like. Not every rule or policy is everyone going to agree with or like. However, it is expected that everyone shows a little grace and understanding in that everyone is doing their best to do right by all youth.

Criticism vs. Clarification- There is a huge difference between the two, starting with your approach. Myself, superintendents, leaders, volunteers, and fair board members are ALWAYS open to clarifying questions. Those putting on 4-H events/activities do not deserve nor will tolerate unnecessary criticism/complaining. If you want change, we have a fair proposal process, and you better be ready to step up and volunteer. **Respect-** You don't have to like what/how things are done, other families, rules/procedures, etc., but you must RESPECT them. You are expected to show respect to everyone, even if you disagree. You are not owed or guaranteed an explanation/justification for every decision/rule made. Still, you must trust that there was thought and reason put into every decision to try and keep a positive and safe environment for all youth. You must respect the fact that sometimes things have to be addressed/changed at the moment and that time does not always allow for a seamless transition. **Conflict-** With anything, there is likely to be conflict at times, but the difference comes in how you handle it. Remember to always respond and not react. Allow yourself and others time to process what is happening and address conflict calmly, coolly, and collectedly. Don't forget that wherever you are, a young person is likely watching and learning from you, so be sure to be a positive role model.

What's your why? - Not every family has the same goals and values when it comes to participating in the fair. Some may want to help their child learn to care for and raise livestock. Some may want to win a grand champion ribbon and be the top seller at the livestock sale. Regardless of your family's why, it is important to remember that what other families choose as their "why" is out of anyone's control. As a parent, this may be hard to explain or rationalize to your youth, but it teaches them to focus on themselves and their knowledge and skill development instead of others. Fun-Let's all remember to have fun! There is so much time, energy, money, and resources that go into 4-H events/activities that if we all are not having fun, we need to figure out something that is. These are the memories that youth will carry with them for a lifetime, so it is our job to make sure they are positive ones.

**Open Door-** Remember that my door is always open. If you have questions or want to learn more, you will get a lot further and have more accurate information coming to me rather than taking secondhand information. So, if we need to chat, just call the office or send me an email, and we can set up a time to do so.

#### Host Families Needed for International Delegates

Looking for fun and excitement this summer? States 4-H and Kansas 4-H has a great opportunity for families this summer to host a new international friend in your home this summer. Kansas 4-H International Exchange Programs are offering hosting opportunities for families to host youth from Costa Rica: June 25 – July 19; Japan: July 21 - August 16; Norway: June 25 - July 19; and Taiwan: July 3 – August 2. Host families are needed to host an international boy or girl. The international youth will be between the ages of 12 -18. Kansas 4-H's responsibility is to make host family assignments matching each delegate with an American same-gender host sibling as soon as possible so that families and exchange delegates can communicate and get to know each other. Any Kansas family with children aged 10-19 who are interested in a cultural exchange may host. A separate bed is required, but not necessarily a separate room from the host sibling. Delegates are 100 percent medically covered with 4-H insurance and bring their own spending money. They can go on host family vacations and camping trips or join their host siblings for summer camps and the county fair. The focus is everyday family life. Interested families can complete the application at https://www.states4hexchange.org/apply/host/ to start the process. The Japanese Delegates' personal information forms arrive in February.
